A \$2,400 settlement was reported in the trespass action of Agnes Cortese, 609 Third St., Dunmore, against Andrew J. and Loretta Klemo, owners of the property at 609-611 Third St., Dunmore.
The settlement was reached after a jury was called in the courtroom of President Judge T. Linus Hoban.
The plaintiff sought damages for injuries suffered when a portion of a concrete caver in and struck her on June 13, 1963, on the defendant's property.
The lawsuit alleged the wall was weakened by the defendants through the driving of wedges between the wall and a picket fence adjoining the wall.

The body of a Pittston Township man, sought since Jan. 30, was found floating in the Susquehanna River yesterday morning at 11.

John B. Chiumento, 34, of 46 East Oak St., Browntown, an insurance agent, had disappeared while making his rounds in the Harding area.

The body was spotted by Nicholas Budjak, West Beatty St., Wilkes-Barre, about 15 feet from the river bank in Plains Township. Mr. Budjak, who was taking a walk, notified Plains Township Patrolmen Ronald Biscontini and Thomas Malchusky.
